Pygmalion

Pygmalion was a Greek mythological figure. He was a king and a sculptor. He fell in love with a statue of a woman that he carved and brought it to life.

Shaw used this myth to create a "modern" (for the early 1900's) interpretation in his play Pygmalion. The play was later made into to a popular movie and later Lerner and Loewe turned it into one of the most beloved Broadway and Movie musicals of all time, "My Fair Lady."

Anyone familiar with "My Fair Lady" will recognize the main characters of Eliza Doolittle, Henry Higgins, Colonel Pickering, Alfred Doolittle, Mrs. Higgins (Henry's mother) and others in this play.

Rehearsals will begin July 6 with read-through and proceed with 2 rehearsals a week via Zoom (days are TBD based on what is best for the cast) and the Performance will be July 31 - done on Zoom and seen via YouTube.

Auditions will consist of making a video of reading(s) suggested by the director (available on the MAD website) and uploading them to a Google Drive location that will be sent by the director to people filling out the Audition Form. The deadline to receive the Audition Form and video is June 24, 2021.

Various "off-stage" roles are needed in order to produce this reading; these include sound design, scenic design, Zoom master, props, and maybe costumes. Call for 2021 Fall Show Submissions

MAD is seeking director submissions for its 2021 Fall Show! Candidates are allowed to submit for up to five shows each, which can be plays or musicals. Each show will be considered as a separate submission, even when presented by the same director. Each submission may also include production and artistic staff members as needed, which may be considered stronger candidate shows. Due to the uncertainty surrounding Goddard's plan to return onsite, the Fall Show will be a virtual production, similar to last year's attempted (but cancelled) show, "Merrily We Roll Along." Because we plan to produce a virtual show, each submission needs to include a technical director. Their duties typically will include leading a team to stream the show, record and edit videos, develop audio tracks and sound effects, and handle other technical requirements.

The Fall Show can be from the public domain or a theatrical company, such as Concord or MTI. If you would like to secure rights to a show, MTI has an in-house streaming service for a select number of their shows (MTI Streaming). Concord also offers some of their shows for streaming, but recommends using a third-party service (Concord Streaming).

The submission for each show shall include the director's name, the director's resume, proposed staff (which may include producer, music director, stage designer, etc.), and your vision for the show. The vision shall present how the show will work for MAD and its audience. This may include a brief synopsis of the show, potential cast demographics, type of dances required, casting flexibility (gender flips/double casting), information on technical aspects, how to manage dated/sensitive material, and other information the director considers important to the submission.
